# Minister's message

Dear friends.

Names are special. When we hear our names spoken, it grabs our attention. Do you know how you were given your name? God chose Jesus' name for him. An angel told Joseph that the baby who would be born to Mary should be called Jesus, which means "the Lord saves." God picked the name Jesus to show that he would be our shepherd and save us from all our sins.

As I think on Christmas and shepherds, another passage comes to mind, John 10:11-15, "I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd sacrifices his life for the sheep. A hired hand will run when he sees a wolf coming. He will abandon the sheep because they don't belong to him and he isn't their shepherd. And so the wolf attacks them and scatters the flock. The hired hand runs away because he's working only for the money and doesn't really care about the sheep. I am the good shepherd; I know my own sheep, and they know me, just as my Father knows me and I know the Father. So I sacrifice my life for the sheep." (NLT)

Long ago shepherds had a difficult but important job. A shepherd lived with his sheep to keep them safe from wild animals. He led the sheep to places where they could find food and water. If a sheep was lost, the shepherd rescued it. Jesus called himself the "Good Shepherd" because he protects and rescues his own sheep – you and me – from harmful things that separate us from God.

As we walk this road towards the holidays, we are more loaded down than usual. You are invited to come, recharge, and encounter the Lord with us in community! Below you will find a list of services; we hope that your family will join our family for Christmas.

### When we are gathered together

One of my great pleasures in life is to attend our St. Philip's Anglican Church to mingle and commune with what can only be described as my extended family.

Gathering together is one of the reasons a building is necessary to accommodate a long series of events. Starting with Advent and continuing through the church year we meet every Sunday and on other days at weddings, funerals, dinners etc.. When we meet Sunday mornings, it is as if we hadn't talked in years. A good example was the recent Advent service presided over by the Reverend Blair

Ross. He made a point that he liked coming to St. Philip's for that very same reason. To chat and catch up on the latest news.

I like to sit in the pew and wonder how many people have walked up to our altar since 1830 to receive communion. We have lost important history information when the church burned in 1920 as all the registers and books were destroyed in the fire. I have not been able to find any records from the pre-1920 period and wonder if somewhere in our community are there records or pictures.

Throughout this year we will be commenting in our newsletter about facts related to the destruction by fire and the construction of our present church. September 9, 2020 will be the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of this event. If any reader has or knows of pictures or other information about the history of St. Philip's church I would appreciate learning about it.
