### **RECTOR'S MESSAGE:**

Do you sometimes worry that you're not really the kind of person to have much of an impact on others for Jesus? Perhaps you feel you don't know enough. Maybe you feel like you are someone who is pretty insignificant in the scheme of things, no great influence nor following on social media? Sometimes it might be that we just chicken out when it comes to 'outing' yourself as a follower of Jesus. Guess what? Most of us have these thoughts and feelings. You're not alone.

This week I came across this challenging and encouraging verse. It's in Acts 4, and tells the story of the incredible impact the apostles Peter and John were having. Through them thousands and thousands of Jerusalem residents were coming to faith in Jesus as Messiah. The Jewish authorities were very concerned and hauled them in for an interrogation. At the end of which we find this comment:

"When they saw the courage of Peter and John and realized that they were unschooled, ordinary men, they were astonished and they took note that these men had been with Jesus." Acts 4:13 (NIV)

So here's the great news for ordinary people like us. To make a difference for God, you don't have to be brilliant, high status, or well educated. You just have to have been with Jesus.

The key to spiritual influence and power is our connection with Jesus.

So let me ask you - how deep is your connection with Jesus? Do you live all your life with him? Do you spend time reading his word (the bible) each day? Do you go through your day in a quiet conversation with him, involving him in everything you do? Do you look forward to gathering in church on a Sunday so you can encounter Jesus more deeply in community?

Wouldn't it be incredible if our little St. Philip's stood out because we are people who've been with Jesus?!


upgrades were completed – soffits, rain gutters, fascias, and metal covers for the church cross and the (former) chimney.

#### c) A wonderful surprise:

My wife, Warden Sally Cowan, was recently contacted through our website by Dr. Elaine Keillor asking where and to whom should she send a memorial gift. As it turned out, her late husband, Vernon Douglas McCaw passed away in 2013 leaving in his will \$50,000 to St.

Philip's Anglican Church. To my knowledge, this is the largest bequest our church has ever received.

How is Vernon Douglas McCaw connected to our McCaw family? No connection was apparent, until I recalled that while writing "East & West of the Rock" for our 2005 anniversary I searched the Anglican Archives in Kingston to collect all the names of people in our Parish who were confirmed so that they could be included in the book. Sure enough, in 1944 the St. Philip's confirmed included a Vernon Douglas McCaw. On page 40 there is a picture of the group that included Phyllis Walker, Shirley Marie McCaw, Shirley May McCaw, James McCaw, William McKinley, Carmen Brown, Jesse Armstrong and Vernon Douglas McCaw. Vernon's family had a farm in Greenbush but its exact boundaries may be difficult to identify at this time.

Information garnered from Vernon's obituary (see below) reveals a man that is very well educated and devoted to education. His wife is a world renowned musician, for many years a Professor of Music at Carleton University in Ottawa. Prof. Elaine Keillor's significant contribution to music in Canada and around the world is referenced on the web.

This memorial gift will be recognized by our Church, and a discussion is underway about inviting Dr. Keillor to a special service at St. Philip's, a church where her husband attended and was confirmed at the age of 15.

### PS. Dr. Keillor also sent an obituary for her husband:

"Vernon McCaw died of complications from idiopathic pulmonary fibrosis on December 5 at West End Villa, Ottawa. He was born on a farm south of Picton in Prince Edward County on February 13, 1929. He leaves behind his beloved spouse, Dr. Elaine Keillor, nieces Lois Brough of Milford, ON, Marlene Baxter of Toledo, ON, Joan McCaw of California and nephews, Lee Lockwood of Aldergrove, BC, Dr. Glenn Lockwood of Ottawa, and Jason Smith of Northport. His parents, William and Eva McCaw, sisters - Lillian Lockwood and Shirley Smith, brothers – Frederick McCaw and Dr. Ralph McCaw, nieces – Corinne Broadbent and Sharon McCaw, and nephew, Daniel McCaw predeceased him.

Vernon attended Queen's University, the University of Western Ontario, and the University of Toronto, to earn BA and MEd degrees. He also studied accounting and statistics. For 16 years he taught at elementary and secondary schools. For the last 24 years of his professional life he worked in accountancy and statistics for the Board of Education, City of Toronto.

During his life he enjoyed attending musical and dramatic performances, cycling, swimming, canoeing, gardening, and painting. Internment at Beechwood Cemetery took place on December 9th. Visiting will be welcome before the celebration of his life to take place at the main Chapel of the Hulse, Playfair and McGarry funeral home, December 14, 2013 at 1:30 p.m. In lieu of flowers, donations to the charity of your choice would be welcome."
