

Dear Friends,

Alleluia! Christ is Risen! These are words that have changed this world ever since the first Easter morning. These words have declared throughout time, that God ultimately wins. Love wins. Life wins.

This year, as I write this short note, I find myself still mostly working from home because of COVID protocols that call on us to isolate, and isolation is such a foreign thing to us. I found myself puzzling over what Easter said to us in the midst of isolation. Wardens' report

Another year in the life of St Philip's has started in much the same way as the previous one ended with recorded services and zoom meetings. The pace picked up very quickly as planning for the Annual Vestry Meeting began and the Selection Committee was formed to begin the search for a new Incumbent.

A skilfully chaired Annual Meeting was led by Fr Don on February 28th. Where possible, officers filling the various positions agreed to remain for another year to promote continuity during the uncertainty of the pandemic. The opportunity to accept donations by Pre-authorized giving or etransfer was introduced with Bruce Walker as the lead.

Early in January, the Leadership Team was directed by Bishop Oulton to begin the process of preparing a profile of our church to be used in attracting a new Incumbent due to Rev Ada's ongoing health issues. Archdeacon Charles Morris has supported our work and that of St Andrews as we prepared a survey for priests and congregants, past and present, to complete. The results of these surveys formed the groundwork for our profile. At the present time, we are working with St Andrews and Archdeacon Charles in the preparation of a "bridge document" that will tie the two profiles together. It will include our collective input for the job description of a new Incumbent: how we will share his/her time and how the two parishes will work together with him/her. We sincerely thank the Selection Committee members for their genuine interest in and commitment to this work: Alfie Deyo, Deb Sawle, Paula Walker, Ted Foy and your wardens.

Other work continues with the ACW and Outreach Committee preparing a list of events we can hopefully hold during the upcoming months, and Elizabeth Hill providing weekly updates to our brilliant new website.

During this time, Fr Don has guided us with a steady hand, providing many opportunities for worship, prayer and cooking-themed Lenten presentations, either in person at St Philip's, or

online. We are most grateful for the time he is so willingly spending with us as we benefit from his many years of experience as an Anglican priest, his daily online prayers, as well as for the sharing of his other talents.

Currently, we have no set plans for future events but we do have some ideas that we hope can come to fruition. The annual Pork & Corn Roast with a tentative date of Wednesday, August 4th is quite a doable event. Gord and I have taken part in the Community Care's "meals for seniors" held once a month and picked up at the View (Picton Golf Club) parking lot. The meal is ordered in advance, so no guessing as to how much to prepare. Wearing a mask, we simply gave our name and popped the trunk lid. St. Philip's Memorial Garden: a glimpse from history*

The coming of spring and Easter reminds me of our Memorial Garden project that took place in 2001 under the leadership of Wardens Bruce Walker and Arthur Cole, as part of an effort to "Beautify our Church Grounds". I do not recall a project at St. Philip's that met with such enthusiasm and support. At that time, we paved the parking lot and the driveway, planted shrubs and trees, and created a focal point with the installation of the Memorial Garden.

As stated in the Marysburgh Mirror of the day:

"The reason we are doing this is to provide a fitting spot where we can visit to remember those that are no longer with us but are forever in our hearts. Father, Mother, Brother, Sister, Daughter, Son, Aunt, Friend or anyone important to you. The memorial garden is for everyone, not only Anglicans, but those of any religion or faith, providing an important, permanent record for all time."

We received great support for this project and more than 40 names have been inscribed. The cost is \$400.00 per name and when several new ones are subscribed, we ask Heritage Monuments to engrave the names. Contact Bruce Walker or Bill Cowan if you wish to get involved. If you recall, the idea came from John Jackson who had read about a similar project in New York City at the church of St. John The Divine on 113th Street. Reverend Jay Wegman stated at that time:

"It offers solace to those in search of calm, a place to do some soul searching or to simply contemplate a flower. This week (Sept 16th 2001) many people sought its benches and the shade of its grapevine-covered arbors."

We thank John for suggesting this same type of project at St. Philip's.

At our most recent bible study, we studied the Samaritan woman visiting a well in the early morning hours and meeting our Lord. As the well is symbolic of a reservoir of faith and hope and life giving nourishment, so is a garden. We recall that Jesus often sought out a garden

where he would go to pray and there is none more memorable than his prayers in the Garden of Gethsemane in the days preceding His death. He prayed: "My Father, if it is possible let this cup pass from Me; yet not as I will, but as You will." (Matthew 26: 36-46)

Spring is also a reminder of the fact that our Church grounds will soon need some care and attention. Back in 2001, Diane Walker designed the flower beds and supplied the product; the result speaks for itself. Every year we must tend and care for our Garden so that it can retain its beauty.
