

Orange Shirt Day began in 2013, inspired by the story of Phyllis Webstad from the Stswecem'c Xgat'tem First Nation, who had her new orange shirt taken away on her first day at residential school. The day, observed annually on September 30, serves as a symbol of hope and healing, honouring Residential School Survivors and their families, and raising awareness about the lasting impacts of the system. Orange Shirt Day also coincides with the National Day for Truth and Reconciliation, established by the Canadian government in 2021 to recognize and commemorate the legacy of the schools and the importance of reconciliation.

We will start with our land acknowledgement, in faith it will lead us to "what is next":

READER: As we begin this Prayer Circle, we acknowledge that we gather on the unceded territory of the Mississauga people, the traditional territory of the Anishinaabeg, Haudonosaunee, Algonquin and Huron Wendat Nations and People. May we honour the Indigenous stewards of this land, and work to grow in right relationship with all Indigenous peoples. We recognize that our Creator God moves us forward together in healing, respect, and unity for future generations.

READER: Let's take a moment to centre our hearts.

At the heart of our faith is the life of Jesus who said, 'Let the little children come to me; do not stop them; for it is such as these that the kingdom of God belongs. Truly I tell you, whoever does not receive the kingdom of God as a little child will never enter it.' And he took them up in his arms, laid his hands on them, and blessed them. (Mark 10:14b-16) The neglect of the dignity of children, whom Jesus welcomed and protected, calls for repentance in action.²

READER: Today, as we pray for Orange Shirt Day, and Canada's National Day of Truth & Reconciliation, we mourn the deaths of the First Nations, Inuit and Metis children who died in Residential Schools. We lament those whose lives and death are known to God alone.

For we know there are more.

There are children buried all over our country, some accounted for, but many hastily interred, with no recognition, no admissions of guilt, no notice to next of kin, no notice of common humanity, no respect for their little bodies – not worthy enough to call hospitals or doctors, so not enough for recognition.

READER: And alongside these silent burials are the broken childhoods of so many more. Many are among us, newly traumatized by the "revelations" that they've known for years.

Their spirits are saying, "You have heard the truth."

And so, having heard the truth, what now?

READER: We are to continue to listen. Believe it when someone tells us their truth. Reach out and support Indigenous organizations. Seek to understand systemic racism and to break the chokehold it has on our ways of life. Resist rationalizing. Review the apologies. Read the Calls to Action and take action. Shed the tears, yes. Wear the orange shirt, yes. But when the tears have dried, will this have changed you? Changed us?

The past is now, for all time exists at once.

And we still pray for the children.³

READER: "A Child Will Lead Us" Prayer from the United Church of Canada

Powerful Christ.

we are grateful that you came to us as a child,

you grew out of a community that nurtured, supported, and taught you the way of your ancestors.

You have asked us to do the same:

to treat every child as we would treat you,

to love every person as you have loved us.

READER: We are grateful that your power is rooted in love, not force;

your strength is displayed through community, not might.

You have taught us to work toward a better world where all of creation thrives, and where every child matters.

READER: On this Orange Shirt Day, we remember Phyllis Webstad as a child, and the stolen childhood of all the children forcibly raised by church-run institutions, known as residential schools.

READER: We lament how these institutions stole from children the opportunity to grow in a safe and loving environment,

stole from Elders the opportunity to share their teachings and wisdom with younger generations; and stole from communities the opportunity to live intergenerationally.

READER: We mourn the children who never made it home,

the communities that were destroyed,

the broken hearts,

the stories never shared, and the shattered relationships.

READER: We ask that you provide comfort to all who are seeking healing and who daily wrestle with the ongoing harmful legacy of these colonial institutions,

strength to all who name how colonial powers have harmed them as peoples and as a nation; often at great personal cost, and courage to all who are working toward reconciliation.

READER: Christ Child,

As you grew, you reminded us to always welcome and care for children.

We remember your children today.

We lament and acknowledge the sinful ways that colonial powers tried to eradicate Indigenous cultures within Canada, breaking Indigenous families,

removing children from their homes while destroying communities.

READER: And we pray for healing, so that we who live together in this country can also work together to build a better future where all children are cherished, beloved, and given what they need to thrive. So that we may treat all children as we would treat you, our Beloved.

May it be so.

Lord, hear our prayer, ALL: For your mercy is great

READER: A Preyer to Remember the Children

God of our Ancestors,

who holds the spirits of our grandmothers and grandfathers and the spirits of our grandchildren, Remembering the Children,

we now pledge ourselves to speak the Truth,

and with our hearts and our souls

to act upon the Truth we have heard

of the injustices lived, of the sufferings inflicted,

of the tears cried.

of the misguided intentions imposed.

and of the power of prejudice and racism

which were allowed to smother the sounds and laughter of the forgotten children.

READER: Hear our cries of lament for what was allowed to happen, and for what will never be. In speaking and hearing and acting upon the Truth may we as individuals and as a nation meet the hope of a new beginning.

READER: Great Creator God, who desires that all creation live in harmony and peace, Remembering the Children we dare to dream of a Path of Reconciliation where apology from the heart leads to healing of the heart and the chance of restoring the circle,

where justice walks with all,

where respect leads to true partnership,

where the power to change comes from each heart.

READER: Mercifully grant that your people, journeying together in partnership, may be strengthened and guided to help one another to grow into the full stature of Christ, who is our light and our life.

Hear our prayer of hope, and guide this country of Canada on a new and different path⁴.

Lord, hear our prayer, ALL: For your mercy is great

READER: A Collect for Orange Shirt Day:

Creator God, Sunk-wi-ya-ti-su and Gitchi Manitou,

Of peace, justice, and concord;

Reader: Open our ears, our eyes, our lungs, and our hearts,

Give us the spirit of condolence.

Instil in us the Good Mind.

Reader: Let us seek your justice in a broken world,

Let us search for understanding in your Creation.

Reader: Help us to be reconciled to you and to each other.

In the self-giving ethic of the Cross,

Let us be emptied of hatred and apathy, greed and selfishness.

Reader: Fill us with the wideness and wildness of your Spirit,

In the name of your Son, Jesus Christ, we ask all this⁵.

READER: Our Psalm is number 19, selected for the National Indigenous Day of Prayer (read responsively by the half verse)

¹The heavens declare the glory of God;

the skies proclaim the work of his hands.

² Day after day they pour forth speech;

night after night they reveal knowledge.

³ They have no speech, they use no words;

no sound is heard from them.

⁴ Yet their voice goes out into all the earth, their words to the ends of the world.

In the heavens God has pitched a tent for the sun.

⁵ It is like a bridegroom coming out of his chamber,

like a champion rejoicing to run his course.

⁶ It rises at one end of the heavens and makes its circuit to the other:

nothing is deprived of its warmth.

READER: A reading from the Gospel of John: The Word Became Flesh

All: Glory to you Lord Jesus Christ

¹ In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. ² He was with God in the beginning. ³ Through him all things were made; without him nothing was made that has been made. ⁴ In him was life, and that life was the light of all mankind. ⁵ The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it.

READER: There was a man sent from God whose name was John. ⁷ He came as a witness to testify concerning that light, so that through him all might believe. ⁸ He himself was not the light; he came only as a witness to the light.

⁹ The true light that gives light to everyone was coming into the world. ¹⁰ He was in the world, and though the world was made through him, the world did not recognize him. ¹¹ He came to that which was his own, but his own did not receive him. ¹² Yet to all who did receive him, to those who believed in his name, he gave the right to become children of God— ¹³ children born not of natural descent, nor of human decision or a husband's will, but born of God.

READER: The Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us. We have seen his glory, the glory of the one and only Son, who came from the Father, full of grace and truth.

READER: A Prayer for Healing

God of Faith, and Faithful God, Heal us, Heavenly One, heal us.

Heal our children, heal our youth, heal our brothers, sisters, and cousins of blood and of community, heal our friends and heal our loved ones.

Heal First Nations, heal cities, heal the provinces, heal our nation and the nations of the world.

READER: We pray today for health and well-being. For strength and for perseverance to live the lives to which we have been called.

We suffer with those who suffer. We grieve with those who grieve.

We feel the anger of those who are angry at injustice.

We find it difficult to hope knowing others despair and doubt that their futures and their loved one's futures will be better.

READER: Pour out your Spirit of healing upon the people of this place. We need you. Send us hope. Help us to pray unceasingly in the power and knowledge that we can do all things through Christ who strengthens us.

You have told us not to worry about anything, but in everything, by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving, to make our requests known to you.

Help us to be gentle with one another in times of trouble.

READER: Help us always and unceasingly to put our trust in you.

Help us to be not afraid.

Help us to walk out from behind our closed doors to serve others as disciples of Christ in the presence and power of your Holy Spirit.

Give us confidence and hearts so full of love for justice that we will not cease to work for the good of others, and for healing and for reconciliation between all peoples⁶.

We ask this through our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ.

Lord, hear our prayer, ALL: For your mercy is great

READER: A Prayer for Justice

As Christians, our work for justice and reconciliation is grounded in Scripture and in our common worship life. We need to pray constantly for God's healing touch in our lives and in the broken relationships between Indigenous and the newcomer peoples. And we need to reflect on the gift of reconciliation we have from God through Jesus Christ.

READER: So we pray: Gracious God,

your Word spoken through the Prophets became the voice that proclaimed your justice and healing in Nazareth; through Jesus you invited all creation into your reconciling love.

READER: As you freed you Son's followers from their fear of the risks of discipleship, so move within us in your love with the strength, the compassion and courage to give of ourselves to the ministry of reconciliation entrusted to us. We pray this through Jesus Christ, your Son⁷.

READER: Prayers for Truth, and the courage for Reconciliation

O God, Great Spirit and Creator,

We praise you for your gifts that surround us – for the gift of the land that gives us food, shelter and water;

For the gift of the sun that gives warmth and light to all that grows;

For the gifts of the moon and stars which you have arranged for your glory;

Lord, hear our prayer, ALL: For your mercy is great

READER: For the gifts of language and culture, through which your peoples praise you, and share the most deeply held values you have engraved on their hearts.

Come upon us, O Divine Healer and open our eyes – to the injustices brought against Indigenous Peoples, their language and culture in Canada's Indian Residential Schools.

Give us repentant hearts – that ache with sorrow for their violence against First Nations families and their children.

Lord, hear our prayer, ALL: For your mercy is great

READER: Give us determined hearts – that refuse to stand by when the dignity of Indigenous brothers and sisters is trampled.

Give us healing hearts – that beat with the drum of Jesus' Gospel, to defend and honour our Indigenous neighbour, their language and way of life.

Give us flaming hearts – that burn with love for you, who come to us ... in every human face ... in every language and culture ... in every gift of creation.

Lord, hear our prayer, ALL: For your mercy is great

READER: Make us stewards – of one another's dignity, of one another's safety, of one another's lands, of one another's right to a cultural identity: ... as unique peoples, ... as gifts to the human family, ... as your beloved children.

Lord, hear our prayer, ALL: For your mercy is great

READER:

Pour out your healing love on all who suffered in Canada's Indian Residential Schools;

- on bodies, minds and spirits wounded through abuse,
- on hearts wounded through separation and disdain,

READER: Jesus – gentle Saviour, forgiving and humble of heart, Good Shepherd, Divine Healer, Great Lover of all peoples:

We offer you our desire to walk with our First Nations brothers and sisters; to journey with them on the path of truth, healing and reconciliation.

READER: As we share this earthly pilgrimage to our heavenly homeland, where every tear will be wiped away and every sorrow will be turned to joy.

Give us one heart and one mind to walk forward together along this path in the love and strength of your Spirit, in truth, reconciliation and peace.

READER:

With God's help, let us undertake the 215 Pledge, being an action plan for the lost Children, who died in Canada's residential schools, that is focused around the 5 stages of grief:

READER: Deny – The narrative that suggests this was an isolated event

READER: Anger – Should be embraced to build momentum for justice

READER: Negotiate – The search for undocumented grave sites across Canada

READER: Depression – Reunite families with the remains of loved ones

READER: Accept – The experiences of all who have been affected by residential schools

READER: And now, we go into the world, changed forever, and energized to strive for justice and peace among all people, and respecting the dignity of every human being.

READER: Our Final Exhortations are from Paul's letter to the Philippians, beginning at Chapter 4

Rejoice in the Lord always. I will say it again: Rejoice! ⁵Let your gentleness be evident to all. The Lord is near. ⁶Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. ⁷ And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.
